ABOUT THE SINGAPORE NATIONAL DAY PARADE PACK...

As part of this year's concept of uniting Singapore as one during our National Day Parade (NDP) celebration, a Singapore NDP Pack will be given to spectators attending the celebration.

The Singapore NDP Pack demonstrates our solidarity as a united, inclusive and driven nation, which has been essential in the recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic in all aspects of society. This also presents Singaporeans with a memento for the joyous occasion.

The NDP Pack will feature 22 designs by artists with disabilities, ranging from ages 7 to 71. These artworks encourage Singaporeans to be grateful for the continuous progress of the nation and to look toward the future with renewed confidence.

In partnership with SG Enable, artists with disabilities from eight social service agencies and eight special education schools created artworks with various messages. This provided them a medium with which they could express their love and aspirations for Singapore.

These artworks capture the creativity and aspirations of their creators, illuminating their colourful and unique perceptions of their beloved nation. Through the artists' involvement, we hope to inspire Singaporeans to recognise their abilities and value them as integral members of our society, working towards a vision of an inclusive society and enabled lives.

The Ministry of Social and Family Development (MSF) has also dedicated 2022 as the Year of Celebrating SG Families (YCF). Some of the artworks featured celebrate the role of families in building a resilient nation.

FRONTLINE

The three ladies streamed into the interview room, beaming with happiness. They were Minah Binte Mohd, Siti Nuraisyah Binte Abdul Manaf and Wang Shi Min Zoe, the artists behind "Frontline Superheroes", a tribute to the efforts and sacrifices of Singapore's frontline workers in fighting the COVID-19 pandemic.

When asked about their inspiration behind including the military in their artwork, Minah recalled the Singapore Armed Forces' role in "helping to call people" as part of contact tracing efforts at the beginning of the pandemic. Synchronously, Minah, Nuraisyah and Zoe's faces immediately lit up when someone in the room mentioned "Ah Boys to Men".

When it came to music, Zoe proudly shared that she likes "army songs". Nuraisyah has a preference for Malay songs, most particularly those sung by Taufik Batisah, she shared while trying to contain her excitement.

On the other hand, Minah's taste in music is slightly more unique. Despite her inability to speak or understand Mandarin, she presented her love for Mandarin songs and even sang a short rendition of Teresa Teng's 《月亮代 表我的心》, The Moon Represents My Heart.

Despite the mask-on interview, their eyes bore the radiance of their smiles. The differences in their personalities were also apparent during the interview. In a show of her care. Minah often assists whenever she notices Nuraisyah facing difficulties in expressing herself in English.

Zoe, a woman of few words, often donates her handicrafts for fundraising and also gifts them to her friends. Nuraisyah is a single mother of two children and somehow still manages to find the time to learn art as her passion.

Love was their common language. One could tell their affinity with one another as they referred to each other as "sisters" and "friends". These artists came together to produce something special in "Frontline Heroes". Through their words and actions, they presented themselves as everyday superheroes, standing up out of love for their families, their friends and Singapore.

Unity is paramount for artists Ang Wei Lun, Tan Bing Yao and Lim Jia Jun Henry. The three of them believe that all Singaporeans should stand together in solidarity regardless of race, language or religion. This shared belief is proudly depicted in their colourful collaborative drawing which shows five multi-racial individuals raising their hands in unison.

The artwork's background features prominent landmarks of Singapore such as the Merlion, Singapore Flyer, the Esplanade, Marina Bay Sands and Gardens by the Bay. Five jet fighters are also seen flying in the sky in a formation customarily seen during NDP.

The artwork was led by Wei Lun who likes to express his extensive imagination through his vibrant and whimsical drawings. His talent is well-observed in his digital drawings on his iPad, where his drawings range from architecture to portraits of others. He has also demonstrated having pinpoint memory; when briefly shown another artist's abstract art piece, he was able to replicate it in his style immediately.

Close companions of Wei Lun, gifted artists Bing Yao and Henry assisted with the colouring of the artwork. Bing Yao prefers painting urban landscapes because he is inspired by the energy and the buzz of the city. He also likes to draw his favourite character, Doraemon. As for Henry, he tends to go for people and animals as the preferred subjects of his artworks. He likes to draw dogs especially since his neighbour owns a big dog that he is fond of. Coincidentally, his favourite character is Doraemon as well.

These three artists are all clients of the Cerebral Palsy Alliance Singapore (CPAS). On a daily basis, they assist with work such as pasting price tags on pens, managing the gift shop and helping out in the workshop. At CPAS, their talents are also further nurtured with art classes where their teachers are of big help to them.

On this National Day, the three of them hope that Singaporeans will always stand united to face any adversities in the future, come what may. Their wish and belief are for Singaporeans to march together into the future as one people, one nation and one Singapore.



Drawing inspiration from a common interest close to their hearts, eight colleagues from Metta Welfare Association collaborated to create "Keeping Mother Earth Healthy". The artwork, created by Donovan Ho Ji Xian, Jozie Keok Yue Ting, Muhammad Fadhil Bin Abdul Jalil, Namira Binte Ismail, Seah Chee Meng, Tan Yan Min, Yong Oiao Oi, and Teo Wen Yin Brenda, is a tribute to our "Garden City" and Singapore's efforts to be a clean and green nation.

The artwork features an array of HDB flats encompassed by lush greenery. The foliage takes up half the artwork, similar to how almost half of Singapore's land is covered in green spaces.

The artists wanted to capture the unique landscape of Singapore, a country of urban living that managed to seamlessly weave nature into daily life.

They also wanted to emphasise the importance of keeping the Earth clean and green.

With eight different artists, each of them bring their own unique styles and quirks to create something special. However, what is common among all the artists is their passion for art. Employed under Arts@Metta, they utilise their artistic abilities to create products which are then sold to the public. These products consist of batik and watercolour paintings, flower bags and pottery. They are then marketed by the artists through various social media platforms such as Instagram live streams and showcased on their online store.

They enjoy different forms of art — Oiao Oi, also known as "Art Oueen", enjoys Batik painting, and Yan Min and Namira both enjoy drawing.

Namira also enjoys projects catered for her loved ones and has even commissioned her own project for them, where she made customised prints for her sisters with their names embroidered. Jozie and Donovan are both passionate about fashion designing, often coming up with clothing designs. Chee Meng is a garden enthusiast who loves shopping for plants and drawing flowers. Brenda likes drawing people with her unique art style, while Fadhil is a big fan of the Japanese Manga art form.

With such diverse characters and ideas to display, one single artwork was simply not enough to capture the essence of these artists' passions. The group of eight has also come together to produce another piece, titled: "Keeping Home Safe".

SG ANIMAL

Finding a way while fighting against the odds has always been what Chan Yi Jun Timothy's life is about. From earning a degree in product design at Nanyang Technological University to playing chess against former world champion Garry Kasparov, being in a wheelchair didn't stop his dreams from taking flight.

When asked to provide a message to young people who are facing adversity, Timothy gave some words of wisdom: "Don't let your challenges or disability hold you back from pursuing your dreams. I never let my disability stop me from pursuing what I want to do. I'll find a way to get there". From scheduling his modules to reduce movement between classes, to utilising 3D printing technology in place of building things by hand, Timothy was able to find ways to create opportunities for himself like squeezing water out of a stone.

This ability to think outside the box is reflected wholly through his artwork.

Wanting to take a creative approach, Timothy's inspiration for the artwork came from Singapore's heritage playgrounds. Each of the four playgrounds in the art piece are portrayed as figures, patrolling the streets of Singapore and defending us from threats.

Just like the animal heroes in his art who fight to keep us safe, Timothy is a hero who fights in his own way. After leaving a robotic maintenance job due to health reasons, Timothy continued to wonder how his disability could create change and assist people. He believes the answer to that lies in technology. To date, Timothy has designed an electric wheelchair based on his own experiences, that improves mobility while remaining lightweight. He is now continuing his journey in design at the Muscular Dystrophy Association (Singapore)'s design programme.

Timothy's ability to overcome adversity with mental fortitude and grit serves as an inspiration for all Singaporeans, propelling them towards conquering the challenges in their lives.





When asked for advice for other young wheelchair users, Daniel left the encouraging words: "Don't give up on vour dreams, try to pursue them!".

Lee and Neena d/o Unni Krishna Marar's
conditions complement each other. By
"borrowing" each other's eyes, Katy's
tunnel vision allows her to do good
close-up work, while Neena's peripheral
vision enables her to design stunning
backgrounds. Together, their artwork
becomes complete. Katy's flowers and
Neena's tree come together to
encompass the very definition of "a
picture paints a thousand words".

Katy chose the colours — red and vellow — each representing a part of Singapore's society that she wanted to express. Red represents what she feels about Singapore and her love for Singapore, while vellow represents joy and happiness as well as nature. To her, "colour is a very powerful communication tool", and "represents all the different racial, religious and language backgrounds". These petals are in the shapes of hearts centred around a little red dot to represent solidarity and unity. Katy claims: "Singapore is like a bloom, so special and so unique, with people coming together for a common purpose and goal — peace, happiness, progress and prosperity".

The very symbolic flower blooms on an equally symbolic tree. The tree represents strength and unity. Similar to how a tree needs to have strong roots to stand, the country needs to have a strong and progressive society in order to have a well-developed nation that offers opportunities. Moreover, the branches of the tree represent progress and growth. Lastly, she chose to draw green hearts in the background as our nation has many different nationalities, and along with all these nationalities and foreign nationals, we can build a resilient and powerful nation.

After joining Singapore Association of the Visually Handicapped, Neena's passion for art was reignited after a long hiatus, while Katy discovered art as a form of therapy.

When asked to share their wisdom, Katy said: "No matter what is going through in your life, keep that hope, and have the courage to move on", and Neena left with the words: "Just be yourself, be happy, enjoy what is given to you right now, and do good for others".

A well-recognised scene from Singapore during the pandemic is encapsulated in a single drawing. This artwork from Mimi Ng shows the Safe Management Measures (SMMs) that everyone in Singapore had adhered to for the past two years.

The scenes drawn are enclosed within the outline of Singapore. Some of these familiar depictions include food delivery riders, online conference meetings and using TraceTogether to check into public venues. On top of that, in the background of the artwork, there is the Vaccinated Travel Lane for Singapore Airlines. Mimi believes that the SMMs were very effective in controlling the COVID-19 outbreak. She stated that the effectiveness is mostly thanks to the people of Singapore and their cooperation; this cooperation was what kept Singapore united through hardship. At the bottom is drawn "Stronger Together Majulah".




Besides the landmarks, he has drawn details such as buses and cars which he highlights as his favourite modes of transport.
